I am now thrilled to be working in the heart of provincial politics alongside some truly fantastic friends.


Hudson is placed with MPP Goldie Ghamari (Progressive Conservative).

Alumni Spotlight



Christine Tovee, OLIP '93 - '94



Tell us about yourself and your career trajectory.

I graduated from the University of Toronto as an aerospace engineer before I joined OLIP. I believe I am still the only engineer that has ever been an intern. After doing my graduate studies at MIT (Massachusetts Institute of Technology), I moved to Europe and worked in the aerospace and defence industry for over 15 years. I am currently a member of Canada's Space Advisory Board reporting to the federal Minister for Innovation, Science and Economic Development, and of the Independent Review Panel for Defence Acquisition in the Department of National Defence. Through my company, CATx Technology, I consult with small and medium-sized enterprises to accelerate their technology development and sustain innovation.

How has OLIP and your time at Queen's Park influenced your career or life?

At the time of my graduation from engineering school, there was little discussion about the social aspects of engineering and technology especially in terms of how technology shapes social challenges and how political and social engagement are key elements to a successful engineering project. After OLIP, I took a number of courses on technology and policy at MIT to expand my awareness of influences. The aerospace sector is highly political and receives a lot of government interest and support. Today, I am pleased that engineers are so much more engaged in public debate and problem solving.



What piece of advice do you have for this year's interns?

I think the biggest lesson from my time as an OLIP intern was that most people involved in any public or political sphere of activities are doing what they believe is their best. That does not mean that I do not get frustrated by sloppy reasoning or advocate for an evidence-based approach to policy-making looking at the long term effects: however, few individuals act out of malicious intent. Coming from this perspective, I think you can approach a dialogue differently. My advice to the current interns is to take every opportunity to ask questions. Learning the art of a good question will take you far.



David Donovan, OLIP '08 - '09



Tell us about yourself and your career trajectory.

I grew up in a small town in Oxford County in the heart of Ontario's dairy and tobacco country, but always had a keen interest in public policy, politics and our parliamentary system. After OLIP, I spent a year abroad before returning to work at the Ontario Legislature in opposition with MPP Bob Bailey (Sarnia-Lambton) and the Progressive Conservatives. Following this I joined Enbridge's government relations team, which provided me an opportunity to further my interests in energy and environmental policy. At Enbridge I advocated for a wide-range of projects in Ontario including renewable natural gas, energy conservation, liquid pipelines, geothermal, wind and solar energy. Since returning to Queen's Park, I lead the Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks' team on key files such as climate change; waste and recycling; air and water quality; and provincial parks.



How has OLIP and your time at Queen's Park influenced your career or life?

OLIP was an amazing opportunity, and has a strong alumni network. My year was full of countless highlights and learning experiences that was shared with a tight-knit cohort of interns, and I remain very good friends with many of them. The programme further solidified my interest in our parliamentary system and public policy. OLIP builds political acuity, and teaches you what actually shapes public policy, beyond what you would learn in the classroom.

What was your greatest lesson from your time as an OLIP intern?

Politics from within an elected member's office immerses you into an environment where you are required to navigate often competing stakeholder interests, while balancing the needs of a constituency and programme. Piloting through this setting is often fast-paced and full of processes that are rigorous and sometimes quite complex. But the challenging environment provides you with the toolset and personal and professional network that is helpful in any professional role.

Government Relations 101

We enjoyed meeting with the government relations team at **Enbridge Canada**, which has been a supporter of the programme for several years. Our partnership with Enbridge has allowed us to learn about the complexities of the energy sector, including how it translates into the world of governance. Tim Smitheman, Enbridge’s Senior Government Affairs Advisor, shared with us that the business of government relations only works when there is a network of trust amongst colleagues, and this sometimes includes making connections across party lines.

As a sponsor since 1998, the **Churchill Society For the Advancement of Parliamentary Democracy** (or Churchill Society) has a long-standing relationship with OLIP. We were grateful to meet with Board members Corrine Murray and John L. Parker. The Churchill Society graciously allows one OLIP intern to serve on its Board of Directors, and all interns look forward to attending the Annual Churchill Society Dinner.



Established in 1922, **Professional Engineers Ontario** (PEO) is the licensing and regulating body for professional engineering in the province. We had the opportunity to meet their team during their evening reception at Queen’s Park. David Brown, President of PEO, shared with us the significance of cultivating our professional network. Mr. Brown reminded us that face-to-face conversations are central to creating lasting impressions with potential employers.



The **Co-operative Housing Federation of Canada** (CHF Canada) aims to inspire, represent, and serve their members in a united co-operative housing movement. We had the opportunity to meet Frank Wheeler, President of CHF Canada, during its Advocacy Day at Queen's Park. Mr. Wheeler highlighted the importance of creating an "elevator pitch" for the issue and its proposed solutions, so that when there is an opportunity to connect with decision makers, one is well prepared.

Advocacy Solutions, a sponsor since 2005, was established by OLIP alumnus Ryan Clarke and is the culmination of over ten years of experience in legal practice, government relations, and business. We had the privilege of hearing Mr. Clarke's reflections on advocacy, and on how learning to personalize a policy or political issue can improve decision makers' understanding of concerns and potential solutions, in order to inform policy changes.



We appreciate having had the opportunity to meet with government relations team members of the **Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce** (CIBC), Elisabeth Laratta and Meredith Taylor, who shared reflections on their work in federal and territorial-level government, respectively. They advised us to become well-versed in current affairs by reading news from multiple sources — in government relations, knowledge is everything!

The **Toronto-Dominion Bank** (TD), an OLIP sponsor since 2001, serves 22 million customers worldwide. We visited their headquarters in Toronto to meet Gary Clement, Director of Government Relations. Mr. Clement drew on his wealth of experiences to remind us that, because the world of politics is small, maintaining positive working relationships is necessary. Teamwork is everything, and colleagues are one's support in finding effective solutions to challenging problems.



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
